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

Approximately 2,000 people annually in the Central Alabama Area are diagnosed with Cancer and will begin treatment at Tri-County facilities. During that period, cancer patients are beginning to focus on one thing, survival. They also need the comforts of knowing that their community stands with them during this trying period in their lives.

Our team's goal is to provide these patients with "Comfort Bags" for newly diagnosed individuals and provide them with some basic needs they will require for treatment. These items include Water Bottles, Face Mask, Pill Boxes, Socks, Thermometers, etc....

Challenges and Opportunities





- Multiple Support Drives are initiated throughout the Tri-County Area related to the Cancer Center
 - Locating donors who have not already committed to support of the Cancer Center's activities in 2nd half of 2019
 - Corporate contributions had to be secured in the next budget year for many donors
- Communication with the Cancer Center Foundation during the project time frame
 - The Point of Contact (Director) changed during the period
 - COVID 19 Shelter in Place Orders interrupted efforts for the delivery of items
 - Repurposing of items to those in greater need
- Coordination of Team Efforts
 - Team has a very Diverse professional background which requires different work times
 - Use of various communications methods (email, apps, monthly Leadership meetings, etc...)



- Support of individuals undergoing Cancer Treatments
 - Give Support/Hope to those who are beginning treatments
 - Reduce the Out of Pocket Costs for both the patient and the Foundation
 - Provide basic items of needs to patients
- Provide the Cancer Center Foundation an Additional Low Cost Resource
 - Project Team added the value of additional Headcount without increasing the Costs
 - Diverse background of the Project Team allowed outreach efforts to move in multiple areas

I encountered cancer firsthand going into my senior year of high school. My mother was diagnosed with one of the fastest-growing forms of cancer, and the doctor told her that she was fortunate to have noticed it early. Within a matter of weeks, she went from this energetic, bubbly do it all person to being weak and not knowing how much longer she would live. It was one of the hardest and saddest times of my life as I watched her war and suffered through chemo and radiation treatments. Little did I know then that she and our family would have to revisit those feelings again for a period as my mother went through three more battles with cancer.

My father was a mountain of a man, and after struggling with my mother through four battles with cancer, also contracted this horrific disease. His struggle started with prostate cancer, spread to lung cancer, and quickly stripped him of strength. My father lost his bout with cancer on February 14, 2014, the saddest day of my life.

To date, my mother has experienced the loss of both her father and her husband to cancer. She has battled cancer in both breast, and Axillary lymph nodes under both arms. My mother now lives with my brother with several side effects of the chemo and radiation treatments like nerve damage and some kidney problems. However, at 87, she is still alive and wearing her victory story well.
